Long Meadow School COVID-19 Risk Assessment Plan Reflecting changes from Government guidance May17 2021

The following risk assessment is for the identification of risk and the subsequent planning to mitigate against these risks following the Government guidance effective from monday 17th May 2021.

All pupils should now be attending school.

Schools have been asked to:

- review and where necessary, update our risk assessment to make sure we are following the system of controls to minimise the risk of infection, including engaging with the asymptomatic testing programme
- have a contingency plan in place for outbreaks in our school or changes in restrictions
- communicate any changes in our processes to parents

The UK Government has worked closely with the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) and Public Health England (PHE) to develop their guidance. Based on the recent ONS data, the risks to education staff are similar to those for most other occupations. Implementing the system of controls, creates a safer environment for pupils and staff where the risk of transmission of infection is substantially reduced. The way to control this virus is the same, even with the current new variants.

Working with PHE, they continually review the measures, which are informed by the latest scientific evidence and advice and update their guidance accordingly. We must comply with health and safety law and put in place proportionate control measures. To meet these obligations we must: review your health and safety risk assessments in light of this refreshed guidance and make any necessary changes to our control measures applying the system of controls.

This document reflects the latest guidance and changes

We will always:

- 1. Minimise contact with individuals who are required to self-isolate by ensuring they do not attend the school.
- 2. Ensure face coverings are used in recommended circumstances.
- 3. Ensure everyone is advised to clean their hands thoroughly and more often than usual.
- 4. Ensure good respiratory hygiene for everyone by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach.
- 5. Maintain enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents.
- 6. Consider how to minimise contact across the site and maintain social distancing wherever possible.
- 7. Keep occupied spaces well ventilated. In specific circumstances:
- 8. Ensure individuals wear the appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) where necessary.
- 9. Promote and engage in asymptomatic testing, where available.

Schools receive support on this through the dedicated advice service introduced by PHE, which can be reached through the DfE helpline on 0800 046 8687, or their PHE local health protection team if escalated. Based on their advice, people who have been in close contact with the person who has tested positive must be sent home and advised to self-isolate immediately and for at least the next 10 full days counting 24 from the day after contact with the individual who tested positive. It is a legal requirement for an individual to self-isolate if they have been told to do so by NHS Test and Trace.

A risk assessment may be undertaken to determine this, but a close contact can be anyone who:

- lives in the same household as someone with COVID-19 symptoms or who has tested positive for COVID-19
- has had any of the following types of contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 with either a PCR test or LFD test (if a confirmatory PCR test is negative, provided it was taken within two days of the positive LFD, it overrides the lateral flow test and close contacts can stop self isolating):
 - face-to-face contact including being coughed on or having a face-to-face conversation within 1 metre
 - been within 1 metre for 1 minute or longer without face-to-face contact
 - been within 2 metres of someone for more than 15 minutes (either as a one-off contact or added up together over 1 day)
- travelled in the same vehicle or a plane

Whilst awaiting the confirmatory PCR result, pupils, students and staff and close contacts should continue to self-isolate. If someone who uses transport tests positive, the assessment is likely to take account of factors such as:

- vehicle size
- degree of face-to-face contact
- length of time in close proximity
- whether a Perspex screen is in place

The advice service (or PHE local health protection team if escalated) will provide advice on who must be sent home and asked to self-isolate. To support them in doing so, we will keep a record of pupils and staff in each group, and any close contact that takes places between pupils and staff in different groups. This will be a proportionate recording process.

Where individuals are self-isolating and are within our definition of vulnerable, school has systems in place to keep in contact with them, offer pastoral support, and check they are able to access education support.

We will use template letters that have been provided for us to send to parents of children asked to selfisolate. This can also be used for staff if needed. This letter will be shared promptly with all parents of children that have been asked to self-isolate as this letter allows parents who are on a low income and unable to work from home to apply to their local authority for financial support under the Test and Trace Support Payment scheme

We will not share the names or details of people with COVID-19 unless essential to protect others

Household members of those contacts who are sent home do not need to self-isolate themselves unless the pupil or staff member who is self-isolating subsequently develops symptoms. This is unless they have been told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace or their public health protection team, in which case they must self-isolate; this is a legal obligation. If someone in a class or group that has been asked to self-isolate develops symptoms themselves within the 10 days from the day after contact with the individual who tested positive, they should follow guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection.

They should get a test, and:

 if the test delivers a negative result, they should remain in isolation for the remainder of the 10-day isolation period - this is because they could still develop COVID-19 within the remaining days

		if the test result is positive, they should inform their school immediately, and must isolate from the day of onset of their symptoms and at least the following 10 full days - their household should self-isolate starting from when the symptomatic person in their household first had symptoms and the next 10 full days, following guidance for households with possible or confirmed COVID-19 infection The school will not request evidence of negative test results or other medical evidence before admitting children or welcoming them back after a period of self-isolation

Other members of their household should continue self-isolating for the full 10 days Staff in school will continue to test with LFDs twice a week at home, as per existing guidance on testing for staff in primary schools and nurseries. Primary age pupils will not be tested with LFDs. PHE have advised there are currently limited public health benefits attached to testing primary pupils with lateral flow devices. Primary age pupils may find the LFD testing process unpleasant and are unable to self swab. This will be reviewed this approach in light of any emerging evidence. Staff or pupils with a positive LFD test result must self-isolate in line with the stay-at home guidance. They will also need to arrange a lab-based polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test to confirm the result. If the PCR test is taken within 2 days of the positive lateral flow test, and is negative, it overrides the self-test LFD test and the pupil can return to school, as long as the individual doesn't have COVID-19 symptoms. Those with a negative LFD test result can also continue to attend school and use protective measures.	
Poor ventilation	children and staff	Good ventilation reduces the concentration of the virus in the air, which reduces the risk from airborne transmission. This happens when people breathe in small particles (aerosols) in the air after someone with the virus has occupied an enclosed area. When our school is in operation, it is important to ensure it is well ventilated and a comfortable teaching environment is maintained. These can be achieved by a variety of measures. • Mechanical ventilation systems	

Risk: Staff and Pupil Attendance	 These should be adjusted to increase the ventilation rate wherever possible and checked to confirm that normal operation meets current guidance and that only fresh outside air is circulated. Systems should be adjusted to full fresh air or, if not, then systems should be operated as normal as long as they are within a single room and supplemented by an outdoor air supply. Natural ventilation Opening windows (in cooler weather windows should be opened just enough to provide constant background ventilation and opened more fully during breaks to purge the air in the space) and opening internal doors can also assist with creating a throughput of air. If necessary external opening doors may also be used (as long as they are not fire doors and where safe to do so). To balance the need for increased ventilation while maintaining a comfortable temperature we will consider opening high-level windows in colder weather in preference to low level to reduce draughts increasing the ventilation while spaces are unoccupied (for example, between classes, during break and lunch, when a room is unused) providing flexibility to allow additional, suitable indoor clothing rearranging furniture where possible to avoid direct draughts Heating will be used as necessary to ensure comfort levels are maintained particularly in occupied spaces.
