POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR

Our emphasis should constantly be on praise. We teach children the behaviours required to be a good learner and a kind person.

Pupils need security if they are to learn effectively. Part of this security is created by an awareness of the behavioural expectations established by the school and recognition that there is a consistent use of praise when their behaviour is appropriate and sanctions when it is inappropriate. At Long Meadow School, children are encouraged to take on these responsibilities and also be responsible for their own behaviour when the desired behaviour is not exhibited. Children are encouraged to be independent - to learn how to sort out problems by themselves and know when to seek adult intervention.

To support positive behaviour all classes display a list of the Golden Rules, Long Meadow School values, rewards and consequences. PSHE is used regularly to discuss concerns and our Pastoral Senior Leader supports children in removing barriers to learning. We aim to provide an exciting and stimulating environment for learning through high quality curriculum, teaching and resources.

GOLDEN RULES

- 1. Follow instructions listen to all adults working in the school.
- 2. Be honest tell the truth.
- 3. Be gentle, kind and polite keep hands, feet and unkind words to yourself.
- 4. Value people's belongings take care of others' and the school's property.

REWARDS

A whole range of rewards is used to promote good behaviour and include:

- 10 Individual Positive (Green) Points = choice from class reward board
- 500 Positive (Green) Points as a class = whole class reward
- Long Meadow Legend award
- Verbal praise
- Learning posted on Twitter
- Awards Assembly
- Show your learning to the Deputy or the Headteacher
- Stickers or notes home

CONSEQUENCES

Children are expected to follow the Golden Rules. For children who misbehave there is a hierarchy of consequences. For more serious incidents, teachers use their professional judgement to move to the appropriate point on the consequences list.

- Always: Verbal warning
- Orange Time out in class
- Yellow Buddy class Time out (loss of play or lunch)
- Red See Phase Leader/SLT and support from Pastoral Senior Leader
- Serious/repeated incidents –
 Removed from classroom to
 DHT/Headteacher
- For very serious incidents, suspensions may be used

Parents will be informed if a child receives an Orange-Red , this may be face to face, text or phonecall.

Participation in residential visits (or associated 'fun weeks') is dependent on high quality behaviour during the year. Behaviour outside of this may mean children are not permitted to participate.

WHAT PARENTS CAN DO TO HELP

One of the most effective strategies in promoting good behaviour is when the school and parents work closely together.

Parents will be contacted where there are concerns, and ways of supporting the child together will be discussed.

If parents have any concerns or there are changes in family circumstances that may affect behaviour, they should contact the school.
