Islam

Muslims believe that there is only one God called Allah. They believe Allah is the only ruler of the universe. The word 'Islam' means submission and obedience to Allah.

Muslims believe in the Five Pillars of Islam. These pillars are five duties that Muslims try to carry out. It helps them to live a good and responsible life, and bring them closer to God (Allah) and their community.

Islam has over 1500 years of Art and Culture. Muslims think it is wrong to try to represent Allah's work or to try to draw Allah or his messenger Muhammad. For this reason, Muslims do not believe in making pictures of humans or animals.

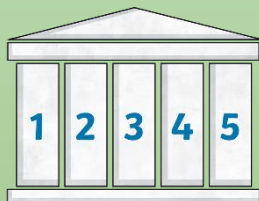

Shahada: the first pillar of Islam, meaning the declaration of faith.

Salah: the second pillar of Islam, meaning prayer.

Zakat: the third pillar of Islam, meaning charity.

Sawm: the fourth pillar of Islam, meaning fasting.

Hajj: the fifth pillar of Islam, meaning pilgrimage.

Geometric patterns: a pattern made up of regular lines and repeated shapes.

Mosque: the place of worship for Muslims.

Calligraphy: beautiful and ornate writing.

Christianity and Islam

Inspirational people are people who show strong values and have acted upon them. Some people of faith inspire others to act with similar values.

Christian inspirational people include William Wilberforce and Michael Faraday, as well as Mother Teresa and Martin Luther King who you already know about.



Muslim inspirational people include Malala Yousafzai, who spoke out against the prohibition on the education of girls. She was born in 1997 and was given a Nobel Peace Prize in 2014 in recognition of her efforts.

The Qur'an is the Muslim holy book. It is believed the words of God, Allah, were revealed to the Prophet Muhammad (pbuh). The Hadith is a collection of tales about events that happened during the life of the Prophet Muhammad (pbuh). They contain information on traditions and stories about being a moral person. Muslims use the Qur'an and Hadith together to help them understand Sharia and the way of Islam.

Islamic and Christian beliefs

Muslims believe it is better to **represent** Allah (God) through words and that pictures should not be used in Allah's representation. **Allah** is known by **99** different names. There are **six main beliefs** in the Islamic faith and Five pillars of Islam (the five most important duties for Muslims).



Christians believe there is only one God who is experienced as three separate forms: **The Father, The Son** and **The Holy Spirit**. These three forms make up **The Holy Trinity**. Each different form impacts how Christians live their day-to-day lives.

How do Christians' beliefs about the Holy Trinity make a difference to their lives?

Vocabulary

Allah: the Arabic name that Muslims use for God. Allah is known by 99 names.

Represent: describe or portray in a particular way.

Qur'an: the holy book of Islam. Muslims believe it is a record of the exact words Allah said.

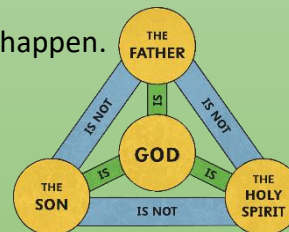
Prophets: special messengers in the Islamic faith.

Predestination: the belief that Allah has already planned what will happen.

The Holy Trinity: the three separate forms that God is known by.

Trinity Sunday: the day when Christians celebrate the Trinity.

Pentecost: when Christians celebrate the gift of The Holy Spirit.



Six Main Beliefs of Islam

- 1) Belief in Allah as the one and only God.
- 2) Belief in angels.
- 3) Belief in the holy books.
- 4) Belief in the Prophets and that Muhammad was the final prophet.
- 5) Belief in the Day of Judgement (the day when Allah decides if a person goes to Heaven or Hell).
- 6) Belief in Predestination.
