# Halloween and Children's Safety - Child Accident Prevention Trust

It's October which every parent knows means two things: half-term and Halloween.

Halloween has long given concern to schools and parents as well as the general public. Largely this has been due to anti-social behaviour, social disorder linked to trick or treating, house party overspills, late opening hours in the nightlife sector and so on.

Whilst schools up and down the country may spend the lead up focusing on preventing antisocial behaviour, there are other dangers lurking for children and young people. These secondary dangers, including unsafe costume design and the low nocturnal visibility of participants, have been addressed in a recent article from the Child Accident Prevention Trust.

# **LMS Well-being**

Have you ever finally got something you've wanted for a long time - a dream job, car, or holiday - only to feel disappointed when reality doesn't match your expectations?

Or avoided something worthwhile, like public speaking, fearing the discomfort, then later realised it wouldn't have been so bad?

This is "affective forecasting"- our tendency to misjudge how future events will make us feel. We overestimate how happy the good things will make us and how miserable the bad things will be.

This can lead to regret, missed opportunities, and dissatisfaction. But we can improve our predictions (and our wellbeing) by reflecting on past experiences, seeking outside perspectives, and recognising our biases.

Here are three ways to forecast better this week:

### In your work

Consult trusted colleagues before big decisions. They'll offer perspective without your emotional baggage.

# In your relationships

Don't make decisions during emotional surges. Wait at least 48 hours so you can make more thoughtful choices.

# For personal growth

Journal your emotional predictions before decisions. Later, compare them with reality. You'll spot your patterns and improve your forecasting.

What emotions do you overestimate or underestimate when thinking about the future?


# Exceptional men in Black History Berry Gordy

Berry is an American retired record executive, record producer, songwriter, film producer and television producer. He is best known as the founder of the Motown record label and its subsidiaries, which was the highest-earning African-American business for decades.

As a songwriter, Gordy composed or co-composed a number of hits including "Money (That's What I Want)", "Lonely Teardrops" and "That's Why" (Jackie Wilson), "Shop Around" (the Miracles), and "Do You Love Me" (the Contours), all of which topped the US R&B charts, as well as the international hit "Reet Petite" (Jackie Wilson).

As part of The Corporation, he wrote many hit songs for the Jackson 5, including "I Want You Back" and "ABC". As a record producer, he launched the Miracles and signed acts like the Supremes, Marvin Gaye, the Temptations, the Four Tops, Gladys Knight & the Pips, and Stevie Wonder. He was known for carefully directing the public image, dress, manners, and choreography of his acts.

Gordy was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1988, awarded the National Medal of Arts by President Barack Obama in 2016, and the Kennedy Center Honors in 2021. In 2022, he was inducted into the Black Music & Entertainment Walk of Fame.



# Bold Women in Black History Tessa Sanderson

Tessa moved to Britain when she was only nine years old. Swapping the tropical Caribbean for an English city might seem a scary move but, helped by her love of sport, Tessa quickly made Wolverhampton her home. She joined the local club, where she showed a lot of promise in the javelin and other heptathlon events. She was a rising star on the field and by the age of sixteen had already won her first javelin championship. By 1976 she had earned her spot in her first Olympics Games.

Meanwhile, she also participated in the Commonwealth Games – in the heptathlon, an event with seven elements (100-metre hurdles, high jump, shot put, 200 metres, long jump, javelin throw and 800 metres), and in 1981 she became the top British woman heptathlete.

Tessa's biggest moment came in 1984 when she won a gold medal for Great Britain at the Olympics in Los Angeles. This made her the first British woman to win Olympic gold in the heptathlon, and the first black British woman to win an Olympic gold.
